It's been another eventful, rewarding year around the EMCS Society board table. Change has been the keynote: We expressed warm thanks and a regretful goodbye to our 2018/19 President Kate Barton in the early summer when she and her family relocated to Prince Rupert. Likewise, we sent sad but hugely grateful best wishes to Program Assistant Reta Vasey and Co-Coordinator Ebony Logins, two "dream team" mainstays in the front office these last six years alongside Anne Bell.

The upside is that change has brought us three bright talents: Sasha Gale, who recently stepped into Ebony's hightops as Program Coordinator; Reta's beaming replacement Aimee McIntosh; and our new Literacy Outreach Coordinator Sarah Richer. Under Anne's expert guidance, these VIP's and their cohorts – Theatre Coordinator Steve Anderson and the Society's loyal, long-standing accountant Diane Chaisson included – continue to ensure the Society, Over 30 years after its formation, continues to serve as a creative, productive, professionally run link between EMCS and the community at large.

All told, the Society strives to live up to the mission statement enshrined in our founding constitution. Our purpose, it reads, is "to partner with the students, parents and the community to build a safe, supportive and challenging learning environment that enables people to make a living, make a life and make a difference." It's a big, open-ended vision that, within necessary personal and fiscal limits, the board and EMCSS staff continue to address.

In addition to opening the remarkable, still largely undiscovered Sooke Makerspace in the school's retooled trades department, a major initiative these last 12 months has been the soft launch of a campaign to revitalize the EMCS Community Theatre. After 20-plus years of loyal service to students and a full compliment of community groups, the theatre is due for a makeover with new seating and sound and lighting upgrades. The ambitious six-figure campaign is off to a strong start thanks to the Society's healthy reserve funds and support from SD #62. Modest contributions to the cause are being banked via the now-annual Sooke Talks, a co-venture with Sooke Harbour Toastmasters showcasing some of the remarkable Sookies living in our midst. Additional grants will be sought and fundraising opportunities explored in the year ahead.

In closing, as Vice-President (Willy) and Past-President (Jeff) respectively, we'd like to extend high fives to our 2018/19 colleagues: Kate Barton, Treasurer Susan Percival and directors-at-large Loretta Deutscher and Laura Fulton. As ever, our meetings are graced by a range of other engaged individuals, among them Sooke PocketNews publisher Britt Santowski, our Sooke Chamber of Commerce liaison Les Haddad and SD #62 trustees Bob Phillips, Margot Swinburnson and Allison Watson. We're also joined on an ad hoc basis by various Society members who have paid a slim toonie for the right to participate in board meetings, learn about the real-world of education in Sooke, and help shape our path forward. Membership is open to anyone/everyone in Sooke, so please consider joining us and contributing whatever time, ideas and energy you can spare.

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

LAURA FULTON



It was an honour to lead EMCS during the 2018/19 school year. We had another year full of strong community, high academic standards, incredible applied programs, amazing athletics, and learning that fostered an appreciation of our natural surroundings. We continue to be proud of our remarkable youth and outstanding educators!

The 2018/19 graduating class won over \$120 000 in scholarships. Nearly half of the graduating class went directly into post-secondary studies at a wide range of institutions, including: Camosun College, University of Victoria, University of British Columbia, University of PEI, British Columbia Institute of Technology, Vancouver Island University, Simon Fraser University, University of Alberta,



and the Canadian College of Performing Arts. Many students are travelling and working with intentions to pursue post-secondary studies after they have taken time to explore the world and earn income.

While many teachers had already begun to include aspects of the new BC curriculum into courses prior to last year, 2018/19 was our first year officially integrating the new BC curriculum. The curriculum is characterized by an increased emphasis on competencies and student choice. Provincial assessments moved towards a grade 10 and 12 literacy assessments, a grade 10 numeracy assessment, and the cessation of provincial exams.

EMCS continued to offer an incredibly rich diversity of programming. Mathematics and science continue to be strengths at EMCS – approximately 14% of our student population elected to take more than one science course, and over 20% of our graduating class enrolled in Calculus 12. Marine Biology was added as a popular junior science elective. Choice in the area of English included studies in Composition, Literary Studies, Creative Writing, Media Studies, First Peoples English and Advanced Placement English. We offered 7 different senior Social Studies options, as well as a strong French Immersion Program. Our arts programs continue to impress with a growing band, thriving musical theatre, and excellent visual and a new digital arts program. Athletics continued to provide strong offerings to students, including a new superfit course and sports performance rugby. The new Careers curriculum was successfully introduced as a blended program. Exit interviews were introduced as part of the senior Career Life Connections course. We were thrilled with the incredible support from the Sooke community in assisting students with this process!

Our learning environment was upgraded in many ways during the 2018/19 school year. We were very proud to unveil three new Coast Salish art pieces in partnership with role model Charlene George. A New Day, 13 Moons and Little Sister now hang in our common areas. Our main commons also received a fresh coat of paint. Our TASK class added benches to our outdoor classroom, which continues to be used for many school and class gatherings. One of our computer labs was converted to a new classroom, creating a more flexible learning space. As part of this, we received a 'floating lab' of 30, 15" chromebooks. Our remaining two student labs were upgraded, and are now in a much better position to support our digital programs such as: Computer Science, Digital Art, Photography, Electronics, Robotics, and Drafting. The woodshop was reconfigured and received an electrical upgrade. All shops received new dust collectors. Our foods room was outfitted with new ovens and stove tops. The gardens directly in front of our school were weeded and refreshed by our district facilities crew. The Ministry of Transportation installed a sidewalk along Edward Milne Road, which has greatly improved safety. The landscaping associated with this project will be completed during the 2019/20 school year. Finally, we successfully introduced a school 'Wolverine' app, and opened both the student and family portals in MyEducation BC which has allowed us to increase our communication with students and families.

Enrolment at EMCS continues at a steady pace, with many new registrations. We hosted approximately 60 international students from Spain, Australia, China, Brazil, Switzerland, Japan, Mexico, Germany, Turkey (late arrival), Colombia, Netherlands.

I look forward to continuing to build on our strong community school partnership 2019/20!

EXECUTE A CY OUTREACH

Books for Breakfast is a preschool story time program that runs once a month in both Sooke and East Sooke from September to May. Snacks are provided and each family is given a book to take home. This last year, the program was offered in East Sooke (for the first time) at the local community hall and in Sooke at the Sooke Family Resources Centre. East Sooke had an average of 11 children per session and 8 families. Attendance ranged from 7 to 18 children and 5 to 11 families. Sooke had an average of 8 children per session and 6 families. Attendance ranged from 4 to 16 children and 4 to 9 families.

The Book Bin program distributes approximately 7500 books to the community in a year. Currently, there are six bins: two at SEAPARC, two at the Sooke Family Resource Society, one at EMCS, one at T'Sou-ke Nation Reserve and one at the Pacheedaht Nation in Port Renfrew.

Family Literacy Day

To celebrate the week of National Family Literacy Day, the Sooke Region Literacy Project (SRLP) partnered with the Sooke rotary, Engineering for Kids Victoria, CFAX Santa's Anonymous and EMCS Society to host a free workshop event for families to explore S.T.E.A.M. activities. The Sooke Community Theatre-EMCS and facility provided space for over 200 children, adults, volunteers and staff to attend.

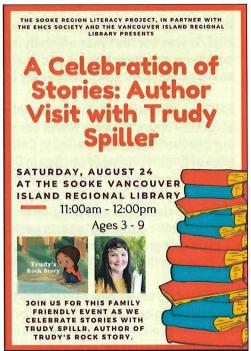

PLAY & LEARN SUMMER CAMP



Play and Learn Summer Camp, now in its ninth year, provides a rich play-based learning environment for four weeks, immersing children in literacy and numeracy activities designed to foster their existing academic skills, and to improve their self-confidence and enjoyment in these subject areas. The program is invariably a huge success.

This year, the program was funded by the EMCS Society, Pacific Institute for the Mathematical Sciences, the Rotary Club of Sooke, Excellence in Literacy Foundation, Decoda Literacy Solutions – Sooke Region Literacy Task Group, Sooke Harbourside Lions, HRSDC, as well as donations from the Cathy's Corner Cafe, Andy's 2 for 1 Pizza, and School District No. 62 (Sooke). These funders made it possible to offer the camp to families at no charge.

There were a total of 25 children registered, and all children attended the camp from four participating schools: Saseenos Elementary, Sooke Elementary, L'Ecole Poirier Elementary, and John Muir Elementary. The grade listed below indicates the level the child was in this past school year. There were 7 children who were of Aboriginal descent and 12 children who were from low income families.

Three coordinators facilitated the camp, leading Literacy, Recreation, and Numeracy. The camp coordinators met prior to the beginning of the camp to discuss schedules, field trips, and expectations for the camp and children.

The 2019 camp again took place at Sooke Elementary School, which is the perfect site with classrooms that allowed flexibility for learning. Everything at the school is properly sized for this age group, and we have now been at this location for five years. The children are a lot more comfortable and confident when in this setting. They enjoyed the two playgrounds, the fields, and the gym. It is also centrally located for parents, providing a more physically and financially accessible location than previous years. Sooke Elementary is also within walking distance of SEAPARC Leisure Complex, where the campers swam every Friday afternoon.

Wildly successful field trips included, Forest Friday's with an afternoon at SEAPARC and pizza, Beacon Hill Park, the Children's Farm and IMAX theatre, The BC Forest Discovery Center in Duncan and Goldstream Park with a stop at the Play Zone.







Quantitative and qualitative measurements show this camp is a huge success and asset in our community. Funding and logistical support from diverse sources speaks to Sooke's considerable commitment to education and literacy.

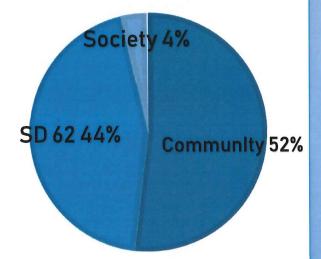

MAKERSPACE



The idea of a Sooke Makerspace was brought to the EMCS Society by a small group of community members, and seed funding was provided by a donor through the United Way of Greater Victoria. Support for this vast project was graciously given by United Way, the School District, EMCS staff, EMCSS staff and multitudes of volunteers. Makerspace officially opened in November 2018.

The Sooke Makerspace consists of a workshop, eventually a computer/robotics and electronics lab, tech shop, and arts and crafts space in the textiles room. Conventional tools and equipment as well as cutting-edge technology such as a 3-D Printer, and a CNC (Cutting Numerical Control) machine are available for use.



The Makerspace is for people of all ages and passions in the Sooke region – DIYers, hobbyists, tinkers, artists, building entrepreneurs, youth, seniors, and anyone curious about the latest technology. It is a place where people can socialize, work individually or collaboratively on projects, and share skills and knowledge – all to facilitate the making of things.

While off to an excellent start in 2018, Makerspace is in a challenging phase. Volunteers have gone over and above to help out, and their ideas and energy have made them indispensable to the opening and the ongoing operation. Though initially open hours were staffed with eager helpers, the space was poorly attended by the public, and volunteer interest waned.

It is our hope that we eventually will have funds to hire a coordinator specific to the Makerspace and we are actively working to make that happen. At this time, we are working to get the space open and in use via one day and series workshops.











YOUTH ENGAGEMENT

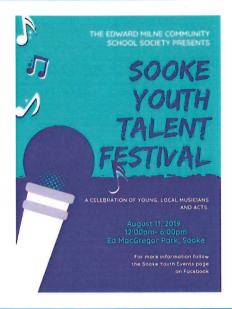
Kyla Lovbakke, an EMCS grad and UVIC Education student, excelled as our *Summer Program Coordinator- Youth Engagement*. She was hired for the summer with assistance from the Canada Student Summer Jobs initiative. She ran two beach clean ups at Wiffen Spit and Ella Beach, both well attended with volunteers and garbage. Kyla also undertook a Maker space open houses in July and August, attended by several people. and a youth talent festival at Ed McGregor Park. She also planned and executed the 19th Annual Trevor Purdy 3-on-3 Basketball Tournament. These events were well attended and well-advertised via social and conventional media. She also coordinated a youth friendly business survey of 8 local establishments, following up with Wild Mountain Food and Drink, the Sooke Regional Library, and Sooke Dance Studio. We thank Kyla for her service and wish her the best as she begins her teaching career.

This year saw the creation of a *Youth Engagement Coordinator* position aimed at enhancing and increasing the capacity of current service providers' ability to meaningfully engage and empower youth in the region. This term contract position was grant funded, and fiscally hosted by the EMCS Society and in partnership with Island Health, SEAPARC Leisure Complex, Boys and Girls Club of Greater Victoria, West Shore Parks and Recreation, and School District No. 62 (Sooke). This position was initially staffed by Katelyn Kennedy and is now shared amongst the former and Carly Bryson, the Youth Recreation Coordinator for Westshore Parks and Recreation.

The project partners sit at the Healthy Schools Healthy People (HSHP) Community Table that includes senior levels from over 25 agencies. These agencies share a commitment to promoting the health and well-being of children, youth, and families in the School District No. 62 (Sooke) catchment areas of the region of Sooke to Port Renfrew and the West Shore (Highlands, Metchosin, Colwood, and Langford). The HSHP table has identified a need to collectively deepen the capacity of meaningful youth engagement efforts in this region. With the leadership of the Youth Engagement Coordinators, this project will provide professional development opportunities for youth service providers and increase the capacity of current services to meaningfully engage and empower youth. The funding for the project will be spent by June 2020.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED, JUNE 30, 2019

1. NATURE OF ORGANIZATION

The organization is incorporated under the Society's Act of British Columbia. Its goals and objectives include providing community education and leisure programs for teenagers and adults of the Sooke Region. These financial statements do not include any of the revenues, expenditures, assets and liabilities of the Edward Milne Community School, which is part of the Sooke School District #62.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- a) Revenue and Expenses
 Revenue and expenses are recorded according to the accrual basis of accounting, except donations
 and gaming revenues, which are recorded when received. Unconditional grant revenue is recorded
 as revenue at the time the Society is aware of a commitment from the funding body. Grant revenue
 is recorded as revenue over the period of time when it is expended on allowable expenditures. The
 unexpended portions of both are deferred and included in current liabilities on the balance sheet.
- b) Capital Assets
 Capital asset purchases are generally funded by way of operating revenues, and are accordingly recorded as expenditures in the Statement of Revenues and Expenditures, and are also capitalized from the Balance Sheet at the time of disposition or retirement.
- c) Amortization
 The Society does not amortize its capital assets.

- d) Kathy Kirk Memorial Fund
 The Society maintains funds donated in trust. Interest generated on such funds is credited to the
 Trust Fund.
- e) Donated Material and Services
 The value of donated materials and services is not recorded in these financial statements.
- f) Income Taxes
 The Society is a registered charity within the meaning of the Income Tax Act (Canada), and is therefore exempt from income taxes on its net operating revenues.

 Pursuant to the terms of the Society's license with the Public Gaming Branch, Province of British Columbia, gaming proceeds may be used for scholarships, library materials, computers, playgrounds, trophies and awards, uniforms and equipment, performing arts, local travel and capital projects, upon approval from the Commission.
- c) Projects (Statement 1(b), Note 6)
 From time to time, the Society enters into contracts or receives grants to facilitate specific projects as stipulated by the funder. This funding is restricted for the sole use of the particular project and is governed by the terms of either the contract or grant.
